Notes: Text Structure - How information is organized in a passage is the structure.

Five commonly used patterns of organization:

- 1. **Sequence:** information is organized in an ordered pattern: steps or a process is explained in the order in which it occurs.
 - a. **Chronological:** information in the passage is organized in order of time. Signal Words: first, next, during, finally, meanwhile, date, etc.
 - b. **Order of Importance:** information is listed in a hierarchy or a priority. Signal Words: first, second, before, next, finally, meanwhile, in conclusion
- 2. **Cause and Effect:** The results of something are explained. Signal Words: so, because, since, therefore, as a result, may be due, consequences
- 3. **Problem and Solution:** a problem is described and a response or solution is proposed or explained. Signal Words: the question is... fortunately, unfortunately, as a result, issue, therefore, trouble, problem
- 4. Compare and Contrast: two or more things are described. Their similarities and differences are discussed. Signal Words: different from, same as, in contrast, as well as, more, less
- 5. Spatial / Descriptive Writing: information is organized in order of space (top to bottom, left to right) or describe in details. Signal Words: next to, beside, up, down, to the right of, under
